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Highlights of Membership Meeting on September 29, 2025

SOECA held its membership meeting on September 29, 2025 with guest speaker Mike Tidwell, author of The Lost Trees of Willow Avenue. Mike's book is subtitled "A Story of Climate and Hope on One American Street." That street happens to lie two miles from us in Takoma Park. The book is an account of the impact that has been demonstrated by climate change in our own county, and a hopeful discussion of potential solutions. Mike's message to us was that we can avoid despair by joining with others to

take action. He invited us to join the Chesapeake Climate Action Network.

Chris Reynolds made a presentation to honor the Hood family as our neighborhood heroes. Angle and Matt provided the energy and organization to make SOECA's block parties huge successes. Thank you, Angle and Matt!

Chris discussed the delay in the Seabury at Springvale Terrace demolition. Also, on Colesville Road, the Hotel Silver Spring has closed and will be converted into multi-family housing, with many units designated as affordable housing. Chris also discussed the FLASH bus service on US-29, noting that a proposed stop at Franklin was not included in the latest plans. Ann Vorce announced plans for a raingarden walk with DEP on October 26 at 8:30 am.

East Silver Spring Community Plan

Montgomery Planning is currently developing the Eastern Silver Spring Communities Plan. The plan area starts east of Sligo Creek up to the Beltway; it includes SOECA homes along Franklin, Manchester, Hamilton, Highview, Caroline, Worth, Leighton, Knox and Sligo Creek Parkway.

At an open house in September 2025, the Planning staff presented ideas pertaining to the neighborhood around the future Purple Line station on Wayne Avenue at Manchester. The planners prompted discussions around the residents' wishes for the community. Planning stated that "Montgomery County is experiencing a serious housing shortage. We need more housing options for everyone, including housing of all types, sizes and prices." They indicated that there is an opportunity as part of the master plan to consider rezoning for

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different types of housing or commercial uses. Attendees were asked to weigh in on strategies for mixed-use development, apartment buildings, duplexes, triplexes and quadplexes. Sidewalks, lighting and parks may also be part of this plan.

According to the Montgomery Planning website "The Eastern Silver Spring Communities Plan (ESSCP) team is working with residents, business owners, and other stakeholders to take a comprehensive look at how people live, work, play and shop in their community, now and in the future. Together we will create a vision for the future of the community and make recommendations to help achieve that vision." Preliminary recommendations are scheduled to be presented to the Planning Board in Winter 2025.

Springsong Museum Update

Plans for Springsong Museum at the southern trailhead of the Northwest Branch Trail on Colesville Road (near Trader Joes) continue on schedule. Over the summer the museum secured a \$50,000 grant and raised the required matching funds. The new museum will be designed by students from Virginia Tech School of Architecture under the leadership of Professor Paul Emmons.

Springvale Terrace Redevelopment

The project team continues working to keep the project moving forward. All funding is lined up, but there are other steps involved before building permits can be issued. The team believes it can close those final transactions in February or March 2026.

In the meantime, they are working with County and HUD staff to approve the demolition of the building as soon as possible. While the timeline is still in flux, they hope to begin demolition in November. The SOECA email list provides a very efficient way to share information. The email list is not sponsored by or supported by SOECA; it was

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started by, and is managed by, Jonathan Bernstein as a benefit to all.

Jon noted that some exchanges he saw in the Spring suggested it would be helpful for him to review the netiquette for the email list.

- This group is not for commercial advertising.
- Messages should be signed with your name and street.
- Discuss issues/problems, not individuals. Refrain from making comments that are negative, harmful, or defamatory—even if the individual is not a member of the email group.
- Remember that the SOECA email group is a public communication, not a private conversation.
- Please don't forward private messages to the group without the permission of the original sender.
- Avoid messages that pass on information that might not be true or might only be partially true.
- Follow the golden rule: Treat other people in the email group as you would want them to treat you.
- Be careful with humor and sarcasm: Tone of voice rarely translates in email.

While advertising is not allowed, there is value in sharing information about events or businesses with whom you have had a good experience. As for politics, please be sensitive to posting about such topics. A good guideline is to freely post about political events but refrain from political advocacy.

Unrestrained Pets. Did you know that Montgomery County has a leash law? Any

dog must be on a leash, even in public parks. Owners of unleashed dogs can be fined. Also, like dogs, cats are required to wear upto-date rabies and pet license tags, and cat owners must ensure their cats are confined to their property..

Pools and Hot Tubs. If you're draining your pool or hot tub for the season, please make sure your treated water doesn't go into Sligo Creek. Chlorine and other chemicals can hurt aquatic life! Car Washing and Detailing. Don't let the runoff from washing/detailing your car go into the nearby storm drain. The runoff can hurt water quality. There are mats you can buy (or make your own) to prevent runoff and be sure to ask your detailer to use a mat to protect the creek. The County has more info here:
